One way that new community members can get involved after their walk is to join a reunion group, go to gatherings (second Friday of each month at Pilgrim UMC in St. Johns), take sponsorship training (offered after gatherings and at other times) and sponsor a pilgrim yourself, make agape and bring snacks for walks, serve on a committee with a board member, sign up on the community web page for prayer vigils, and come to candlelights and closings.

Another important way to get involved is to work in the behind-the-scenes jobs, referred to in this community as auxiliary positions. "Why Can't We Do It Like Cursillo?"

We understand your question. Many others have said the same thing. Emmaus shares fundamental aspects with the Cursillo tradition. There are, however, many variations within the Cursillo Movement itself. Sometimes people ask, "Why doesn't Emmaus do it the way it was done in Cursillo?" without realizing that Cursillo weekends vary from state to state and from country to country. While the fundamental structure is held in common, particulars in Cursillo often differ. As an international program, the Emmaus Office is trying to develop a standard program that prevents Emmaus fro being remade after the likeness of the various leaders. When we rework the Emmaus Model, adding this part and removing that part, we increasingly diminish its potential for working as a whole toward communicating the Christian message on many levels. Most additions and changes in the model accommodate the team members, not the pilgrims (e.g. footwashing, Mananitas, etc.) The Walk does not need to include every meaningful religious experience or reflect every Cursillo variation, and it cannot address every need in life.

Also, changes by independent-minded team members set a dangerous precedent. While their innovations may "work", future teams may want to claim their right to be creative as well and to try out their own ideas.

Changes become tradition overnight because new pilgrims believe their experience represent the way Emmaus should be. Traditions build upon traditions. The Emmaus manual serves as the plumb line that prevents traditions from developing and keeps each Walk centered on the prescribed program.

While this was a little long I hope it helps you understand why we are asking you to do Walks in line with the Emmaus Model. Remember too that the pilgrims don't know the difference. Other communities have run a weekend per the Emmaus Model and the pilgrims had a great experience.

Pastor Rick Warren summed in up very nicely in the first sentence of this book 'The Purpose Driven Life': "It's not about you."

The purpose of Emmaus is the renewal of the Church as the body of the risen Christ in the world through the renewal of church members as faithful and committed disciples of Jesus

I would like to thank Ned and Karen Weller for their work on the Team Selection and Nominating Committee the last 3 years. Ned also served the community by providing the training for new board members, lay directors, and sponsors and served as the candlelight and closing coordinator last year. Continued from pg. 1 You <u>must</u> be signed up ahead of time in order to work. After all the auxiliary positions are filled, there will be a backup list will be prepared of those willing to come and fill in if needed.

According to the Emmaus handbook that our community has committed to follow, there is a process called progressive servant hood that is followed. This process ensures that each person gains the experience in different areas so that they can confidently serve in increasingly complex positions on the Emmaus weekends. It is a leadership training method as well as ensuring that the walks run smoothly with trained volunteers that results in a good experience for pilgrims and team members alike.

All community members must serve 72 hours (the length of an entire walk weekend) in the auxiliary or behind-the-scenes positions before progressing to the conference room. You do not have to work an entire weekend all at once. It is good to work a few weekends in these positions to understand how everything fits together, but not mandatory.

Once you have served in auxiliary positions, you are eligible to work first as an assistant table leader. You normally would not give a talk in this position. There are also music positions available after you have served as an assistant table leader once. There are 3-4 mandatory meetings required to prepare to work in the conference room. If you are not able to make all the meetings, which are essential for team formation, training, and bonding, then this is probably not the walk for you to work. If you receive a call to work and get a message on your machine, please call back with a yes or no answer – this is very important so that we may move on to other names and not delay the recruitment process!

Please also be in prayer whenever you are asked to work in auxiliary or conference room to see if you are able to clear your calendar to work. After being an assistant table leader, you are eligible, if you are suited for the conference room, to be a table leader. Normally table leaders give talks. You may work as a table leader a few times to prepare you for the next level, or you may be ready after working once.

You may be eligible to be an Assistant Lay Director after being a table leader. In order to be a lay director of a walk, each person must serve twice as Assistant Lay Director (ALD). Not everyone is suited for the conference room, and some enjoy being an assistant table leader, but aren't interested in serving as a table leader or other positions or giving talks. Serving at one level in the conference room does not guarantee you will progress to the next level automatically. Remember though, that sometimes you need to stretch yourself to grow!

You must also serve in a lead auxiliary position to be a walk lay director. These would be one of the following: auxiliary head, assistant auxiliary head, co-auxiliary head, head cook, co-head cook, or assistant head cook. The auxiliary and the conference room work together to ensure a smooth walk, and working in these lead auxiliary positions helps potential future walk lay directors see how everything fits together.

Team Selection Committee, made up of several community members and the Community Lay Director, make decisions on conference room positions based on experience, suitability, and spiritual maturity of individual community members through the discernment process and recommendations from past walk lay directors and the board. They also train the lay directors and provide support for them during the team formation process and are also responsible for assigning talks and for recommending auxiliary lead positions and kitchen heads.

So, to sum up, new (and old) community members first serve in auxiliary and can continue to work in auxiliary for years to come. Once they have served 72 hours they may qualify to be an assistant table leader, a table leader, an assistant lay director twice, an auxiliary head or head cook, and then a lay director.

Another way that you can serve your community after some experience is serving on your board of directors becoming part of the decision-making process for the community. I hope to hear from you soon!
